





PREFACE

This booklet is intended as a practical guide for librarians, teachers, and adult study group and organization leaders who are interested in obtaining resources for studying various aspects of today's world.

The entries are arranged in four categories—(1) general world topics and world problems, such as disarmament and land reform; (2) the major cultural areas of the world and a few countries which are constantly in the news; (3) resources for teachers and others, such as maps, films and filmstrips, and music; and (4) addresses of value to readers in their search for further materials and addresses of publishers of materials listed in this guide.

In order to keep the lists brief and practical, only a few titles are listed under each theme. These consist usually of a few books and pamphlets for adults, some materials for young people, and some for children. The lists for young people are shorter in most instances than those for adults and children as it is assumed that good readers in high schools can handle the materials listed for adults and that poor readers will need to use the materials listed for children.

The criteria for the selection of items have been relevancy, recency, readability, and reliability. In the case of controversial issues, materials on various points of view have been included, as on China.

For more detailed accounts on Africa, the Middle East, and South America, readers are referred to the other titles in this pamphlet series and to publications of World Affairs Materials, Brooklyn College, Brooklyn 10, N. Y.

Many individuals and organizations have helped the author in the selection of resources for this guide, but he assumes full responsibility for the items which were finally chosen.
